

Looking back on the last year there is much to be thankful for. It has been incredibly successful, faced with both challenges and accomplishments. The school horses are in good, sound health and participating in the lesson program as solid citizens. The lesson program continues to grow, and the barns are full of hay for winter. It takes people of all kinds, ages, and back rounds to ensure all the pieces of Eddy Farm fit together. The Eddy Farm is fortunate to have so many people supporting it.

One highlight of the year was the Doris Eddy Memorial Event. As it does every year, the Memorial Event took place on the third Sunday in August. It was a beautiful, sunny, 78 degree day. Perfect for a horse show! Fortyeight dressage tests were ridden and scored. Thirteen of the tests were ridden by Eddy Farm students on horses that call Eddy Farm their home.





Eight years ago, when I started teaching a group of 5 year old little girls, it was a figment of my imagination that those same girls, whose feet didn't go past the saddle flaps, would go on to represent themselves, their horses, and their farm, in a horse show. The now 11, 12, and 13 year olds are walking out in all weather to catch their mounts, helping with chores, and taking pride in their hard work, knowledge of the horse, and freshly swept barn floors. Over the course of the last 12 months, these young women, my first young students, have come full circle. They are now helping with summer camps, bringing horses in for beginner lessons, and often times reassuring the younger, less experienced riders that the saddle is in the right spot and the girth is tight enough.

These girls continue to prove to themselves that with dedication and hard work, anything is possible.

A Glimpse Into Eddy Farm Therapeutic Riding Programs

Down a curving dirt road, not far from the workaday doings of town, the Eddy Farm School has to be one of the secret jewels of Middlebury! Besides plentiful mud, hay, and other substances, it produces a regular yield of kindness. I know this because it has been my privilege as a Family Outreach Worker (employed by the Counseling Service of Addison County) to bring elementary school age kids, (particularly boys) from the far flung comers of Addison County for therapeutic lessons and groups at the farm for over a decade. These kids come from a variety of backgrounds and experience challenges for which CSAC provides support and therapy. Among all the duties of my position, without reservation I can say that promoting a horse/child relationship is clearly beneficial!

There are some myths regarding the equestrian experience, as well as for kids with challenges, that time at Eddy Farm has firmly dispelled for me. One is that is equestrian activity is primarily for girls, and that boys given a choice might not be pulled away from their screen time or their ATVs. This is false. I have come to know that boys when given the opportunity are very excited to interact with horses, and that the horses have a way of entering their imaginations, and dare I say their hearts, in a manner that is not simply extraordinary, but actually can be healing. Another - that boys who find school hard and who have difficulty paying attention and focusing, do not wish to engage in a sustained period of effort and work in order to achieve a goal. Also false! The lessons here are not like a pony ride at the fair, for the boys at each visit will work from 30 to 40 minutes or sometimes more: preparing, brushing, and tacking their horses for the session. To the surprise of parents and teachers, these kids often embrace the duties with a purpose and even a devotion that in some instances can also be seen to have an effect on what happens at school. There are some boys for whom the activity becomes the main event, and who actually take a particular liking for the skillfulness and perseverance required to pick poop from hooves.

Far from meaningless chores, to groom and tack the horse, become a means where kids enter a relationship with what must seem to them an awesome being for whom they are able to provide care. They learn to look for "hurts," get to know how their horse likes to be scratched, and are excited to learn to discern how a big animal is feeling from the expression on its face, the gaze of its big eyeballs and the movements of its ears. They learn that if they can give their full attention to the animal, the consideration will frequently be returned. It's not unusual for kids to feel small or overlooked in the adult world, but this attention that they give in a concrete way to the feelings and well-being of an animal yields multiple lessons, in patience, effort, and for facing for fears and challenges. The horse becomes a powerful friend. I have known boys who have told me of having dreams of their horse, and one who put a picture of his steed beside the bed to help with nightmares. The most immediate grace for many participants is certainly a feeling of pure joy which warmly spreads across their face. So wonderful to watch! I can remember one small boy who once mounted in the saddle could just not stop singing as he circumambulated the arena. So I am thankful to be able to have the opportunity to be a witness to this through the years, and to write this short piece, to acknowledge the immense gratitude of all these boys to the farm, and to their illustrious and patient teachers, Margaret and Alicia, , but especially for those magnificent beings whose large eyes see much, and whose strong backs can bear almost any burden that the boys bring in their bodies and minds. The guys will be sure to have an apple for them the next time they come!

My summer camps turned into weekly lessons, Friday afternoon lessons that I still have to this day. These afternoons are like no other, I don't give them up for school dances, swim meets or homework because the time I spend at Eddy Farm is special.

Eddy Farm makes me feel safe, peaceful and happy. There is a calmness to horses and to the farm that rids me of my stress whenever I'm there. I always know that no one will force me to do something I feel uncomfortable doing. I have developed a unique relationship, not only with the horse I ride but with the people at the farm. My encounters with them never fail to brighten my day. I'm so lucky to be surrounded by such a lovely community of people that are so respectful, hard-working, and share the same love for horses that I do.

Despite what it may look like, riding requires more skill than the ability to sit. These skills, I had to develop over time with patience. With any goal, it's difficult to find motivation because you can't see improvement day to day, but if you persevere, eventually you'll see when your work makes a difference. Horses helped me realize that I had to make a commitment to my goals if I wanted them to be reality. The little moments of success I have with horses are extremely rewarding, it makes me appreciate the time I spend with them even more.

Eddy Farm is truly a learning experience, but it's way more fun than high school. I wouldn't be the equestrian I am without the knowledge I've gained from the opportunities I've had. Horses are not pieces of equipment that can be shoved in lockers; there is a whole lifestyle to horseback riding which separates the sport from others. I love that Eddy Farm gives me nothing less than the entire equestrian experience because it allows me to better connect with my horse and gives me an appreciation of the time I spend riding.

Eddy Farm is truly one of a kind. I'm always taken aback at how hard these people work to carry out the legacy of the farm. I'm absolutely amazed at how involved Eddy Farm is within the community. I'm honored that I have been given opportunities to make these events possible. I've helped out at camps, the annual Easter egg hunt, and just this past summer I helped the farm prepare for their show. I've learned so much and have had a lot of fun. 
